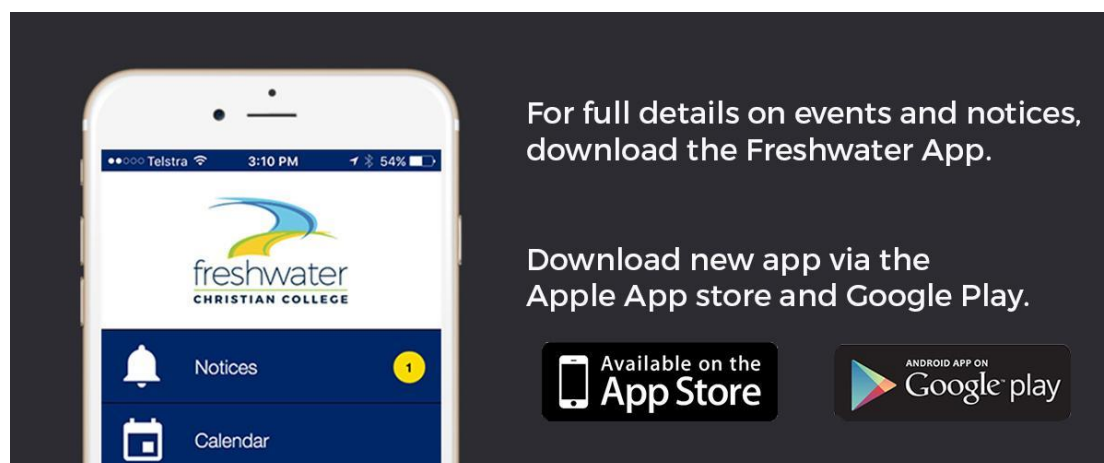

Working Together

We are a Christian School where Jesus Christ and His Love are a part of all that we do. Children are encouraged to join in classroom prayer times and chapel services. We would ask each family to take time to pray for your children's teachers and peers. If you have a need for which the class can pray, let us know, as we are all a part of God's family. Feel free to communicate with your child's teacher and we welcome you to become involved in classroom life, with the class teacher's assent.

Your child's introduction to School

Prep

In Prep we focus on investigating, understanding and effective problem solving as well as developing a sheer joy in learning. Initially, Prep students will engage in meaningful activities that foster early writing, reading and mathematical skills. Foundational work in English and Mathematics will then be introduced to develop the skills necessary for a smooth transition entry to Year One. Children will also have experience in other Key Learning Areas, including music and Japanese. The Jolly Phonics program is used to develop strong phonemic awareness and sound sentence writing.

At this level of early childhood development, it is important for our program to be flexible and to cater to group and individual needs. Social skills (sharing and caring for others) and role-play are encouraged as an important part of learning, leading to a better understanding of oral and written work. Students are encouraged to be active learners through inquiry-based play and hands-on activities which develop basic skills. Literacy and numeracy foundations are explicitly established during Prep.

Year One

Our Year One program builds on the strong foundations established throughout the Prep year and extends students to begin formal education in all key learning areas with an emphasis on learning by doing so as to develop fluency and independence. Year One introduces a more formal approach to teaching, without losing the play and fun to learn approach from Prep.

Year Two

Our firm foundations in Prep and Year One allow our Year Two and Three students to explore further the areas of mathematical thinking, especially strategies, place value and problem-solving. They continue to develop further their written and spoken English skills towards a strong independence that will allow them to transition well into Senior Primary.

Curriculum

Students who attend Freshwater Christian College are welcomed by teachers who are dedicated to seeing them develop their character and academic potential. Our students are encouraged to engage in language, music and sports.

Devotions

Our school is Christ-centred and our morning always begins with devotions every day in the classroom and during Chapel, which is held in the Church Auditorium. Parents are more than welcome to attend and can check with the teachers or office for days and times.

Students take time to learn Bible verses, hear Bible stories and discuss how to apply them to life. Scripture Memory is the trophy Year 1-3 can earn on Awards Night.

It is our firm belief that the development of a child's spiritual being is important for their overall development, life journey and future success.

Literacy & Numeracy

Our foundational target is for students to be able to spell, read and write accurately and with confidence and to be able to apply mathematical thinking and strategies accurately. Students learn to read by applying semantic (general word knowledge), syntactic (grammar conventions) and phonological (letter sounds) cues as well as developing an extensive sight vocabulary. They learn to construct different texts using appropriate forms of genre. Listening and speaking skills are also emphasized. Skills in Literacy underpin all key learning areas.

Effective reading comprehension skills are taught explicitly and with intention. There is a sound emphasis on using mathematical strategies, understanding place value and patterning, and being able to apply mathematical knowledge to different real-life situations. Students enjoy learning by doing through an inquiry hands-on approach and using their skills in relevant situations. Connecting with digital technologies provides opportunities for greater connection, understanding and extension.

Music

All students join in the school music program. There is one formal lesson per week. Music and singing are also part of many classroom lessons. Students learn to read, write and compose music and to play the recorder from Year 3.

Students may also take part in the Instrumental Program at an age-appropriate time. Lessons are available in brass, strings and woodwind instruments are available for a fee. Chess

Students will receive chess tuition every fortnight as part of our mathematics curriculum. Research around the world has indicated that chess benefits students in their learning and our college is investing in this process through the use of our chess coach. We also offer Chess Club during school lunch breaks for students in Year 1 and 2 as an Extra-Curricular option to help advance their skills. Students have the opportunity to participate in regional chess tournaments in Terms 1, 2 and 3.

Japanese

Students participate in one Japanese lesson each week. Japanese tuition continues into Senior Primary and Secondary.

Sport

Our Primary Physical Education teacher is responsible for a program of games, skill development and an introduction to sports, athletics and swimming. Students wear sports uniform on the designated sport day for their class. All Junior Primary students participate in an intensive swimming course in Term Four and are involved in our Cross Country, Athletics and Swimming Carnivals.

Library

Students have a library lesson each week and may borrow books during this time. All students require a school library bag (available from the College) as part of the Stationary Scheme.

On The First Day of School

- Please bring morning tea and lunch
- Dress in full school uniform on the first day of school.
- Please ensure your child/ren's name is on ALL their belongings.
- Feel free to come to the classroom to settle in your child/ren.
- If there are any special needs on this day, please write them down and leave a note on the teacher's table as they may not be able to give you their full attention between 8.30 am and 9.00 am.

Some children are confident when starting school while others feel nervous and teary on this big day and find it difficult to leave mum and dad. If your child seems upset, please remember that we have their best interest at heart, even if we suggest that mum or dad goes home. Feel free to phone the Primary Office to see how they have settled in if you are worried, or we will call you to reassure you.

Children entering Prep and Year One should be encouraged to:

- Write their own name (Capital letter followed by lower case e.g. Michael)
- Write their name on ALL belongings – especially on their hat
- Know the difference between their food for morning tea and food for lunch

- Tie shoelaces if necessary
- Go to the toilet independently

School Hours

School hours are from 8.30 am to 2.50 pm with the first bell ringing at 8:25 am.

Please do not be late as this upsets essential classroom routines. If circumstances arise which result in the student being late to school, we ask that you check-in at the Primary Office on the way to class to be marked onto the roll and receive a "Late Slip" for your teacher.

Likewise, if students are leaving early during the school day, they must be signed out at Primary Office. Prep students must be picked up by an appropriate aged person. All students are collected in the afternoon at their classroom unless they take the bus or are in they attend OSHC.

A bus service and out of school hour care (OSHC) are available if needed. Casual or permanent bookings are available with these services.

As a safety precaution, please advise your child's teacher in writing of any changes to your usual procedures. Prep students are not required to be signed in or out, however, students need to say "Good Afternoon" to their teachers (who will note they have been collected by their parent/guardian). Teachers must be informed prior if another person has been arranged to collect your child for safety reasons.

Food for School

Diet is important for young growing bodies. Please limit the number of "treats" and the amount of pre-packaged food in your child's lunchbox. For morning tea, we recommend you choose from crackers or fruit, a sandwich, cheese, yogurt or a healthy snack. We encourage your children to drink water. Lollies, chocolate and high sugar processed foods are not allowed in Prep and are not recommended in any student's lunch as they can have a negative effect on learning and behaviour.

Our College is a Nut Free School. We ask you to refrain from including products, due to allergic reactions which can be experienced by some children already in the College. This includes Nutella and Peanut Butter.

Please ensure your child/ren have an adequate breakfast before coming to school so that they are at maximum learning capacity to start the day.

We have fridges in classrooms and ask that you use a lunchbox, not an insulated bag, as they do not fit into our fridges.

Food Purchases

- FCC Café orders can be written on a brown paper bag or orders placed online via the website Flexischools. Students are not allowed to purchase their lunch over the counter.
- Bag orders for the Café are put into the class Cafe box in the class and all orders are delivered to the classroom for morning tea and lunch.
- Online Café orders through the Flexischool website are accepted up until 9 am on each school day. This ensures that our café has enough time to prepare all orders in time for morning tea and lunch. The website for Flexischool is: www.flexischools.com.au
- The café is open five days a week for morning tea and lunch.
- A fundraising Cake stall is held every second Wednesday at morning tea. Classes take it in turn to supply the home baking. Children purchase goodies for 50c and funds raised support overseas children and community projects. Cake stall is held on every even week of a term, starting from Week 2. This program is not operating through COVID-19 restrictions.

What can parents do to promote success?

To develop an early delight in reading books and a desire and need to learn to read, we suggest you read to your child as much as possible. Make this an enjoyable time together for all involved. Remember to talk about what you've read to develop deeper thinking.

Encourage number recognition through incidental counting activities. Point out and discuss the numbers found in the environment. Use lots of mathematical vocabulary in conversation e.g. light and heavy, near and far, over and under, less and more.

When your child asks a learning question, ask them what they think before you give the answer. This encourages them to realise they can think about things themselves. To know what they think is important and to verbalise the thinking process encourages confidence, success, independence and a delight in learning.

Reporting

Reports are written to current student outcomes in line with that Year level and incorporate a 5 point marking system. Formal written reports are issued for semesters one and two.

Parent/Teacher interviews are held prior to the Easter and September holidays. This is a time for parents and teachers to discuss student progress, hear the good things that are happening and to decide on ways to work through any areas that may need addressing. End of semester reports are electronically emailed to parents to help receive them in a timely manner.

Stationery

All Primary stationery is provided by the College. Parents are not required to purchase any additional stationery.

School Uniforms

All students are expected to be in the correct school uniform at all times. Hats are an essential part of the uniform and the rule is:

NO HAT, NO PLAY

Please do your best to adhere to the correct college uniform requirements.

Prep Students

College sports shirt and shorts, black shoes and blue socks. (No coloured shoes or sandals please).

Year One, Two and Three

Boys: Freshwater College Primary boys shirt and navy shorts. A wristwatch is the only acceptable accessory.

Girls: Freshwater College Primary girls blouse and tunic.

Hair ties must be in the school colours of green, blue or gold. Earrings are studs or sleepers only and a wristwatch are the only acceptable accessories.

N.B. Please, no other jewellery as loss causes distress.

Shoes & Socks: Black polishable shoes with navy blue socks (No boots please)

Sports Uniforms (worn on designated days):

Winter: school jacket is available for winter.
